POTTERY.

GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITING POTTERY AS A MANUFACTURE AND NOT AS FINE ART.

I. Pottery of all kinds will be exhibited, viz., Earthenware, Stoneware, Porcelain, Parian, etc., including Terra-Cottas used in Building, with new raw materials, machinery, and processes for the preparation of such manufactures.

II. In this Class the following Trades, together with any others engaged in the production of Pottery, may submit specimens of their respective branches of production:—*

III. A Producer in each of the Trades may submit a specimen of each kind of object he manufactures, although such specimen may form only a part of a complete object.

IV. The aim of the Exhibition being to bring prominently into notice specimens remarkable for excellence, novelty, invention, etc., it is desirable to limit the number of specimens from each producer to those which are absolutely necessary: consequently, no duplicates of any object can be admitted.

V. Thus, it is desirable that Exhibitors should send only one specimen of the same kind of object, such for instance as one tea-cup, one saucer, and one plate of the same tea service; one dish, etc., of a series or pattern; one plate, one tureen, one vegetable dish, etc., of the same dinner service; one jug of a series; one garden vase, one drain pipe, one tile of the same pattern, etc.; one toilet jug and basin. But they may send several specimens each belonging to a different series or pattern; and if a different pattern is put upon objects of the same shape a specimen of each pattern may be sent.

VI. The name of the object, as well as that of the manufacturer, should be securely attached to each article.

VII. All objects of Pottery must be delivered at the Exhibition Building into the charge of the proper officers, unpacked and ready for immediate exhibition, on Friday the 10th, or Saturday the 11th February, 1871.

VIII. To every object, when exhibited, will be attached a label, prepared by Her Majesty's Commissioners, which will contain the following particulars:—

1. The name of the object.
2. The materials of which it is composed.
3. The Exhibitor's name.
4. His address.
5. If of sufficient importance, the name of the designer or actual maker.
6. The reasons why it is exhibited, such as—
 - Its body or composition.
 - Its form.
 - Its surface pattern.
 - Its novelty.
 - Its excellence.
 - Its cheapness.
7. The price, if the Exhibitor pleases.
8. Any explanations, etc.

IX. Foreign Commissions are requested to furnish these particulars, both for the purpose of the Catalogue and also to facilitate the preparation of the necessary labels, on or before the 1st January, 1871.

NEW MATERIALS FOR POTTERY.

X. Newly-discovered materials used in the production of Pottery and new combinations of old materials may be exhibited.

XI. Persons engaged in the following Trades, or any other Trades connected with the preparation of the materials used in the manufacture of Pottery, may submit specimens of their productions :—

XII. It is desirable that the specimens of Materials should not be bulky, but such as can be exhibited in bottles or glass cases on a wall. The probability of admission will be greatly increased if the object be small.

XIII. The name of the material, as well as that of the producer, should be securely attached to each object.

XIV. All materials used in the production of Pottery must be delivered at the Exhibition Building into the charge of the proper officers, unpacked and ready for immediate exhibition, on Friday the 10th, or Saturday the 11th of February, 1871.

XV. To every specimen, when exhibited, will be attached a label, prepared by Her Majesty's Commissioners, which will contain the following particulars :—

1. The name of the material and source from whence it is obtained.
2. The Exhibitor's name.
3. His address.
4. The reasons why it is exhibited, such as—
 - Its value and importance.
 - Its novelty.
 - Its superior excellence.
 - Its cheapness.
5. The price, unless the Exhibitor objects.
6. Any explanations, etc.

XVI. Foreign Commissions are requested to furnish these particulars, both for the purposes of the Catalogue and also to facilitate the preparation of the necessary labels, on or before the 1st January, 1871.

NEW MACHINERY FOR POTTERY.

XVII. New machinery and apparatus will be admitted, and recent inventions relating to the different parts of the various machines and appliances used in the manufacture of Pottery may be shown either as complete machines, or separately in parts. Machinery in motion and new processes of manufacture may be shown.

XVIII. Persons engaged in the following, and other Trades in the United Kingdom connected with the manufacture of Pottery, may submit specimens of their productions :—

XIX. Exhibitors whose Machinery is admitted, and requires to be fitted together, will have to arrange it themselves in the Exhibition, but Her Majesty's Commissioners will, unless otherwise stipulated when the objects are admitted, find the necessary foundations.

XX. The name of the machine, as well as that of the manufacturer, should be securely attached to each object.

XXI. All Machinery must be delivered at the Exhibition Building on Wednesday the 1st, Thursday the 2nd, Friday the 3rd, or Saturday the 4th February, 1871.

XXII. To every object, when exhibited, will be attached a label, prepared by Her Majesty's Commissioners, which will contain the following particulars:—

1. The name of the object.
2. The purpose to which it is applied.
3. The Exhibitor's name.
4. His address.
5. The reasons why it is exhibited, such as—
 - The novelty of its invention.
 - The superiority of its productiveness or efficiency.
 - Its greater economy in producing.
 - Its cheapness.
6. The price, unless the Exhibitor objects.
7. Any explanations, etc.

XXIII. Foreign Commissions are requested to furnish these particulars, both for the purposes of the Catalogue and also to facilitate the preparation of the necessary labels, on or before the 1st January, 1871.
